Letter to the Church - 24th March 2020

To the Church Family at KBC,

I wonder how many times you have heard the word 'unprecedented' over the last few weeks. Countless times right? Which is incredible because I am not sure I ever heard it used more than a handful of times prior to this event. I am sure you know what it means but just in case - it is an adjective that means 'never been done or known before'. In the context of the coronavirus outbreak we talk about unprecedented events and the responses and measures taken to fight it as unprecedented - without previous instance, never known before or experienced. Unprecedented. But if I am honest I am getting a little tired of hearing it being used and I can't help but wonder why those using the word, don't mix it up a little, try some of the synonyms like unequalled or unmatched or unrivalled or extraordinary or outstanding or striking. They are all pretty good words, that would fit but instead, it seems, we are sticking with 'unprecedented'.

So, let me remind you about another unprecedented event in human history, only I will mix it up a little. It is about the Father, who so loved the world that He gave His one and only Son. In an extraordinary event we remember as Christmas, the Son of God was born to a virgin, wrapped in clothe and placed in a manger. He grew in wisdom and stature with men and God and then at just the right time He came announcing, 'Repent for the Kingdom of heaven is near'. It was an outstanding message, no one had ever heard it before. As the people flocked to listen to Him and bring the sick to be healed, they witnessed the unrivalled miracles He performed. His own followers declared, 'Who is this man, even the wind and waves obey Him'. Throughout His ministry He displayed love, compassion, grace and mercy. He offended the sensibilities of the religious elite and stood up to those in power in a way unequalled in their history. To say His whole being was striking would be an understatement. Then because of their jealousy, fear and to fulfil the words of the prophets long ago, in an event of unmatched cruelty the religious elite plotted and had Jesus crucified. Little did they know that He is the way, the truth and the life and His death would swing a door of hope for all nations, wide open.

I know it's not a perfect exposition of the gospel, but it does point us towards hope in difficult times. Hope which Paul prayed for the church in Rome saying, 'May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace as you trust in him, so that you may overflow with hope by the power of the Spirit'. Hope which I am praying for each of you today. And just in case

it has slipped your mind in these troubling times, there is much to be hopeful about. Hopeful that He is working for our good according to His purposes in all things. Hopeful that we can do all things through Christ who gives us strength. Hopeful that He is at work in us and around us and for us because the Father is always at work. Hopeful that ultimately, He will make all things new. Be filled with hope and share your hope in the One who is good, with others.
